

- iii)Feedback from learners on teaching of curriculum is discussed in HoDs meeting and suggestions are made for improvement in the curriculum over telephone to the affiliating University. Informal feedback from guardians are also considered.
- iv)The departmental library and central library procure text books relevant to curriculum and provide priority and special consideration to the needy and deserving students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

For quality teaching and learning, the academic calendar, class routine and teaching plans are prepared before the commencement of the class. The course content, lesson allotted to individual faculty is intimated to the learners at the beginning of the classes.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

6.3.4 Research and Development

The college takes initiative to promote research activities and adopt some strategies in this regard such as- information of the international/national/state/local level seminars, of research journals are provided for easy access to the teachers and students. Logistic support is given.

As a result, 01 faculty member was in the verge of submission of PhD Thesis and 02 others are perusing the same. 02 faculty members was participated in refreshers course. No. of publication in different fields continued. One book with ISBN, 09 papers in National and International journals were published. Participation in National/ International Seminars also continued. 09 in national Seminars participated with papers.

Initiative was also taken to boost research climate among students, which resulted in undertaking of field based study and project work by students of four and six departments from arts and science stream respectively.

Students undertook field based study in local area.

342 students participated in study tour to Bhutan Chawki, Bhutan as a part of Environmental Science field study

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college ensured proper management of human resources available in the college through judicious distribution of duties and responsibilities. Faculty and staff training are also done on necessity

So far students are concerned, the college endeavours to develop human resource primarily through successful implementation of curriculum to bring the desired goal.

Effort was made for the leadership and healthy competitive spirits among students through Students' Union, NSS and NCC unit, College Magazine, organisation of sports and cultural activities, extension activities, etc. for development of human resource. Research culture among students was promoted through project/ field based work. Skill development programmes were undertaken.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Recruitment of teachers and other employees are made as per the guidelines of UGC as well as the state government.

Part-time teachers are recruited as and when necessary. This year part-time teacher were recruited in the department of Political science, Education, Philosophy, Arabic, Hindi, Assamese, Anthropology, Botany, Physics and Mathematics.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college has no formal industry interaction/ collaboration. However, the students are given information of the industries and reputed institution and are guided to get into those. Efforts are being made to have collaboration with institutions and industries.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- An admission Committee is formed every year, which follows government rules related to reservation and admission.
- The selection of students for admission into different classes is done strictly on merit. To maintain transparency in this regard, merit list is hung up in the college notice board one day prior to the date of admission.
- Major seats are allotted entirely at the sole discretion of the concerned departments. Moreover, major selection test is conducted wherever necessary.
- Besides, admission counselling is done on the date of admission.

ANALYSIS OF STUDENTS' FEEDBACK: A SUMMARY YEAR: 2017-18

Feedback from students and parents is taken for the session 2017-18 to improve the teaching-learning process of the institute. In this regard, the present student feedback system adopts randomized sampling method, where 200 undergraduate level students have been interviewed. As a tool of investigation, closed ended questionnaire is constructed using LIKERT scale method. The questionnaire for students basically encompasses five broad areas, e.g., assessment of teacher, assessment of administration, assessment of support system, assessment of library and assessment of basic requirements. In the similar manner, the questionnaire developed for parents encompasses areas like overall development of college, student-teacher relation, cooperation to students, etc.

Key Highlights:

- ✓ The feedback reflects that teachers must give due importance on the areas of latest development in the subject, supply of relevant study materials, etc.
- \checkmark The feedback suggests that the college office needs to be more cooperative with students to their needs.
- ✓ The library should procure sufficient books and journals to accommodate students.

The feedback is analysed and discussed in the general meeting, where measures are identified and suggested for necessary implementation.
