6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college has an Academic Committee, which sits periodically on the issues related to curriculum and takes initiative in this respect in the following ways:

- i) The Academic Committee of the college held meeting in collaboration with Teachers' Unit of the college and Barpeta Zone of Assam College Teachers' Association (ACTA) on the newly introduced Semester system, Where Dhrubajyoti Choudhury deputy Controller of examination of Gauhati University and Prof. Dipak Kr. Sarma, Director of College Development Council, G.U.
- ii) Feedback from learners and guardians on teaching of curriculum is discussed in HoDs meeting and suggestions are made for improvement in the curriculum over telephone to the affiliating University.
- iii) The departmental library and central library procure both text and reference books relevant to curriculum and provide priority and special consideration to the needy and deserving students.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

For quality teaching and learning, the academic calendar, class routine and teaching plans are prepared before the commencement of the class. The course content, lesson allotted to individual faculty is intimated to the learners at the beginning of the classes.

- Projector is encouraged as is used in class room teaching.
- > Supplying hard Copy and soft copy of study materials to students is done as regular Practice.
- ➤ Apart from existing remedial classes, special classes of tutorial nature for advanced learners are arranged.
- ➤ Inter-departmental collaborative teaching is practiced on allied topics for better understanding of the concepts.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- ➤ Final examinations are conducted as per guide lines of the Gauhati University.
- ➤ Unit tests and class tests are held regularly
- ➤ Home Assignments & Seminars assigned regularly as part of evaluation.
- Field study is conducted as a part of evaluation process.
- ➤ Evaluation process is discussed among the departmental colleagues and students are shown evaluated scripts to bring about improvement in their performance.

6.3.4 Research and Development

As a result a proposal on national seminar use of Biotechnology in Agriculture for sustainable Development was submitted to Department of Science and Technology, New Delhi. 04 papers by faculty members were presented in national seminar and 06 faculty members participated in national seminar without paper. Five faculties from Department of Assamese, Economics, Botany and Zoology were granted Fellowship under U.G.C. FDP. Besides three faculty members from the department of Economics, Education, Political Science and English are doing PhD on part-time basis.

Initiative was also taken for promoting research culture among students. They are encourages ton undertake field based study and participate in seminars. 10 Seminars were conducted with student-participant. One field study to Darjeeling, North-Bengal and another to Chandrapur, near Guwahati were undertaken.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- More books were purchased for library
- Two LCD projectors purchased
- Infrastructure facility is increased in respect of up-gradation of toilet for boys, new parking stands for two wheelers, renovation of Arts Building and construction of conference room and distance education
- Installation of punching machine for recording attendance of teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college strives to develop human resource primarily through the successful implementation of curriculum to bring the desired goal.

The mission of "search for Talent and its Nourishment" undertaken two years ago continued. Remedial Coaching Classes and special classes were arranged keeping in mind the need of the students.

Coaching classes for entry-into service, engagement in research and extension activities were carried out.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Recruitment of teachers and other employees are made as per the guidelines of UGC as well as the state government.

Part-time teachers are recruited as and when necessary. This year part-time teacher were recruited in the department of Political science, Economics, Education, Philosophy, Arabic, Hindi, Assamese and Anthropology

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The college has no formal industry interaction/ collaboration. However, the students are given information of the industries and reputed institution and are guided to get into those.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

- An admission Committee is formed every year, which follows government rules related to reservation and admission.
- The selection of students for admission into different classes is done strictly on merit. To maintain transparency in this regard, merit list is hung up in the college notice board two days prior to the date of admission.
- Major seats are allotted entirely at the sole discretion of the concerned departments. Besides, major selection test is conducted wherever demand ratio is greater than 1.
- Besides, admission counselling is done on the date of admission.

ANALYSIS OF STUDENTS' FEEDBACK: A SUMMARY YEAR: 2011-12

Feedback from students and parents is taken for the session 2011-12 to improve the teaching-learning process of the institute. In this regard, the present student feedback system adopts randomized sampling method, where 120 undergraduate level students and 50 parents have been interviewed. As a tool of investigation, closed ended questionnaire is constructed using LIKERT scale method. The LIKERT scale ranges from 1 to 5, where 1,2,3,4 and 5 indicates not satisfactory, satisfactory, good, excellent and outstanding respectively. The questionnaire for students basically encompasses five broad areas, e.g., assessment of teacher, assessment of administration, assessment of support system, assessment of library and assessment of basic requirements. In the similar manner, the questionnaire developed for parents encompasses areas like infrastructure facility, quality of academic resource, encouragement to students, safety, etc.

Key Highlights:

- Assessment of teacher reflects that, the effort and support by the faculty members are in the range of 3-4, which implies that some teachers should be more pro-active to fulfil the students' need.
- Regarding administration and support system and library services the expectation of
 the students are average. It therefore, demands that the administration and support
 system should be prompt and judicious enough to fulfil their expectation.
- The parents feel that quality of academic resource and safety is excellent. Besides, environment of hostel is also conducive for study.
- Parents feel that encouragement that provided by both administration and teacher to students is excellent and it helps to boost self-confidence of the students.

The analysis of students' and parents' feedback is discussed in the general meeting, where measures are identified and it is resolved for implementation.

Practice 1: Effective Teaching- Learning Process

The practice of Effective-Teaching Learning Process targets

- to create a homely environment for poor and meritorious students
- to increase the enrolment of students belonging to SC, ST and Minority community

- to produce better results

The college is located in an area where majority of the population belongs to SC, ST and Minority community and many of the students are deprived of higher education due to poor financial conditions. - provide Book Bank facility to poor and meritorious students

The college is now a home to students of diverse cultures and has managed to reach out to students belonging to BPL families, SC/ST and Minority communities and remote areas. The introduction of remedial classes, special classes, inter-departmental classes, tests and ICT have indeed improved the quality of education as a whole. The pass percentage of students has increased to a great extend. The enrolment of girl students has also increased. Some students belonging to poor families were provided with Book Bank facility and this has indeed boosted their zeal to excel in education. As a result of the practice of Effective Teaching Learning process, the literacy rate of the rural surrounding of the college has improved. This shows that the college has undeniably contributed to the socio-economic and academic development of the surrounding rural areas.

Practice 2: Institutional Aid to Poor Students

The literacy rate of the surrounding area of the college is vey low. The college is located in an area dominated by people belonging to SC, ST and Minority communities. In addition, most of them belong to BPL category. The National Survey indicates that people belonging to SC, ST and Minority communities are deprived of education due to poor financial condition and hence their literacy rate is very low. Besides, the college is situated in a flood affected area as it is lowland and the river Brahmaputra is just 6 Kms away.

The college authorities have been providing financial aids to students time and again from UGC fund to attract them towards higher education and provide them relief.
